# "Auntie. .We no mo' food at home!" Keiki Cafe to Expand in Year IV

(Lihue) Last year, we noticed that some of the youth at the Keiki Cafe were hiding some of their food — instead of eating it. They were simply "stocking up" to have enough food for the week-end (or to share with their younger brothers and sisters). It broke our hearts to hear, "Auntie, we no mo' food at home!"

Thus, the new "Backpack Program" was born, and begins August, 2007. Nutritious food will be provided in unlabelled backpacks so children will have food at home when other food supplies are not available. Nutrition education will also be offered to youth to prevent obesity often caused by



eating cheap, but fat-filled foods.

Three years ago, the Kauai Food Bank started the only Keiki Cafe in the State of Hawaii. The Keiki Cafe feeds nutritious foods to hungry children in a structured, after-school setting.

Located at the Boys and Girls Club, Waimea Clubhouse, the Keiki Cafe serves "super-sized" snacks five days a week to needy children aged 7-17.

The Keiki Cafe is moving into Year IV and expanding because of support from the community and YOU!

### Food Stamp Outreach Program

With funding from the Hawaii Community Foundation, and the Annie Sinclair Knudsen Foundation, the Kauai Food Bank is coordinating food stamp outreach efforts to our eligible kupuna on Kauai. Sadly, our seniors show the lowest food stamp participation rate of any group who may be eligible to receive food stamps.

Working in partnership with the County, State, and our volunteers (we call them our "Akamai Kupuna Club Members"), we help eligible kupuna complete and submit the 22 page food stamp application.

Food stamps are the nation's premier nutrition program, but Hawaii's food stamp participation rate from 2000-2005 has actually decreased about 19%. A federal entitlement program, Hawaii is currently losing about \$76 million each year in unused food stamp benefits.

Food Banks simply cannot make up this loss, and the prudent thing to do is use our resources to bring in new food dollars to Kauai.


