The Covid-19 pandemic demanded our adaptation to properly serve a larger set of in need people. Beginning in 2020, Kauai communities have dealt with higher unemployment, interest, and inflation rates. This setback heavily affected those struggling to stay afloat. As 2021 wound down, many began to see a shimmer of normalcy. However, there are those who have yet to catch up from the effects of the pandemic. There remain many that require assistance until they are able to get back up. Looking forward, we will continue to be there for those in need as we all recover.

# Summary of Programs

## Keiki Café Program

KIFB supports Kauai student academic enrichment by providing programs with daily after school snacks. Nutritious snacks enable students to **focus on what matters most...** studying hard and playing harder! During after school hours, keiki begin to reminisce of lunch and dream of dinner. Students are provided daily after school snacks by program coordinators. Coordinators say that they are grateful for the snacks provided, as it saves them from having to pay out of pocket for something that is often needed. Snacks like fresh fruit, yogurts, granola bars, and trail mix are delivered on a weekly basis to all programs. Partnering with organizations like Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii and the Kamaaina Kids A+ Program allows KIFB to service over 500 students daily throughout the island.



# Summary of Programs

## Backpack Program

Students coming from in need households often rely on free or reduced-priced school lunches. Over the weekends, these families struggle to meet the needs of their hungry keiki. Students may be left to fend for themselves or inevitably go hungry. The KIFB Backpack Program **helps to alleviate financial stress**. We pack ready to eat foods as well as items for meals that can be stretched over the weekends.

Foods are packed in an easy to take home bag and allocated to students through program coordinators at the end of the week. KIFB provides food packages to multiple schools and services upward of 250 students a week.



# Summary of Programs

## Kupuna Delivery Program

Partnering with other prominent non-profit agencies on Kauai, KIFB has been able to provide monthly deliveries of foods to low-income **home bound seniors**. These agencies receive meal ingredients from KIFB on a monthly basis. With their team of volunteers, each work to pack and distribute boxes to 130 kupuna in different elderly communities around Kauai.



# Summary of Programs

## Weekly Warehouse Food Distribution

Every Wednesday, we host an average of 50 families through our regularly scheduled distributions right from our warehouse. We distribute a variety of produce, dairies, meats, breads, drinks, and even non-food items donated through community members, local businesses, hotels, and big box stores.

## Emergency Food Distribution

Patrons that are not able to attend regularly scheduled distributions are welcome to stop by **without an appointment** during operating hours. Those in need with dietary restrictions, and food storage and cooking limitations, are accommodated to the best of our ability.



# Summary of Programs

## Partner Agencies

Approved third party agencies act as the arms of the food bank. Agencies are often able to reach further than our warehouse and into **niche communities around the island**. Partner agencies receive foods, clothing, appliances, and other necessary items for program operations. These items are purchased from the KIFB warehouse at little or no cost. Items are distributed through organizational programs where they deem fit.



# Summary of Programs

## Growing Food Together

KIFB has developed an **innovative collaboration** between our warehouse and three fruit orchards on the island. Fresh fruits are harvested by KIFB staff and used in programs and warehouse distributions. We charge a fee for our picking serves, and all fruits picked are reported back and are considered a charitable donation, available to be used for tax deduction purposes.

## Gleaning

Local backyard gardeners, traditional farmers, and schools island wide, are encouraged to grow a little bit extra to donate. This initiative **promotes a healthy lifestyle** of giving, eating healthy, and fosters personal relationships between the food bank and our community.



# Community Contribution

## Pikake Neighborhood Collection



Paul and Reba Roy, organized an annual neighborhood food drive within the Pikake subdivision. The couple went door to door talking with neighbors or leaving a note stating that within the next few days a labeled bag would be dropped off with a printed sheet showing particular non-perishable food items that the food bank could most benefit from as well as a pick-up date for these bags to be left back outside. On top of what was collected, the couple also purchased additional items to help stock our shelves. In total, over 850 lbs. of most needed non-perishable food items were delivered to our warehouse. This was such a great way to get a community banded behind a similar cause!

## Hiileis Birthday Wish



In lieu of birthday gifts this year, Little Miss Kauai, Hiilei Berg, requested donations to aid her goal of 1,000 lbs. of rice to donate to KIFB. A week after her coronation as Little Miss Kauai, Hiilei, began her campaign through her social media outreach. Celebrating her 10th birthday, she asked for a \$10 donation + \$1 for good luck! Through friends, family, and strangers on the internet, she was able to raise enough money to purchase over 1,400 lbs. of foods, including the initial goal of 1,000 lbs. of rice. She will forever be held as an inspiring example by parents and children when it comes to asking for birthday gifts!
